Dear Families,

I hope you all had a good week. Did anyone manage to sleep through the thunder and lightning on Wednesday night?!



During the parent meetings we held, a few parents have mentioned homework and asked why we don't give children more. There is a national debate about homework in primary schools and we have done a lot of research over the years. A couple of years ago, we did a parent survey and the overwhelming response was that parents didn't want us to give sheets and sheets of homework each week. Instead, we give spellings weekly, we expect children to read daily and we expect the children to learn their times tables as they progress through the school.

The reason we believe primary school children shouldn't have too much homework, is simply that research shows that the impact on children's learning is minimal. Also, for some families, receiving homework can be hugely stressful. We need to ensure that we support all our families and the last thing we want to do is to add to any stress a family may be going through. We also know that all too often, older siblings are doing homework for younger siblings, which then becomes pointless.

In addition, we actively encourage families to talk to their children about their learning at school. When children recap on their learning verbally, it really helps the knowledge they have learnt move from their short-term to long-term memory. This will really help the learning 'stick'. Each term, parents can see what their children are learning on our website. (<u>Click here to</u> <u>access</u>) If you look at this, you will be able to ask your child about what they are doing at school. Also, on Google Classroom, many year groups have lists of websites you can access to support your child further at home.

We hope you understand our reasons for not giving more homework. Please come and speak to me if you have concerns.

Emotion Coaching Workshop for Parents - 7th May

Does your child sometimes express their strong feelings inappropriately? Do they sometimes find it difficult to take on board your helpful suggestions when they are distressed? (If so, they are a normal child!)


Emotion coaching is a way of encouraging connection and supporting positive behaviour, through speaking with young people in a way that helps us to 'connect before correct.' This workshop will teach some simple phrases and strategies to engage with a child who is experiencing strong emotions so that they can be supported to understand their feelings, manage in the moment, learn from the experience and to work with the adult to plan for how to cope with similar situations in the future. It is linked to positive improvements in children's behaviour and in adult-child relationships.

This workshop will introduce you to emotion coaching and leave you feeling able to use emotion coaching phrases confidently when speaking with your child(ren). All parents and all school staff are being offered this training, so that it can become part of a universal approach to supporting all children's wellbeing and behaviour at school.




